

## **High Quality Instructional Resources**



Teaching the Kentucky standards through research-based strategies, comprehensive, engaging materials, and teacher supports

The Kentucky Department of Education cited some interesting studies in a brochure about High Quality Instructional Resources (HQIRs). The first study found that when teachers didn't have access to HQIRs, they tended to go online to find their teaching resources. This led to uneven educational materials that mostly impacted low-income students of color. The second study showed that if students had access to one HQIR for four consecutive years, their performance led that of other students by 38 percentile points. The last study the Kentucky Department of Education's brochure provides shows that providing HQIRs simultaneously helps teachers and saves taxpayers' money. Using HQIRs can be almost 40 times as effective as reducing class size.1

Kentucky wants to give its students as many advantages as it can, so it has implemented a program to encourage the use of HQIRs in its schools. Kentucky defines HQIRs as materials that are:

- Aligned with the Kentucky Academic Standards
- Research-based and/or externally validated
- Comprehensive to include engaging texts (books, multimedia, etc.), tasks and assessments
- Based on fostering vibrant student learning experiences
- Culturally relevant, free from bias
- Accessible for all students

These definitions show that Kentucky knows

that a good education goes far beyond what the student sees. It must rest upon state standards and use research-based teaching strategies. It must also take all students into account, creating a learning environment that engages students from a wide variety of backgrounds. These rigorous requirements are designed to encourage schools to adopt only the highest quality materials.

One popular HQIR is Studies Weekly, which provides a comprehensive set of curricula for social studies, science, and wellness. Current standards correlations that show how materials align to Kentucky state standards are available. For example, in social studies, 4.C.PR.1 mandates that students be able to "Describe the processes people use to change rules and laws." Studies Weekly covers this over the course of four weeks:



The Studies Weekly student edition is a colorful, newspaper-style consumable that can





As publications are developed, a neutral lens is paramount. While the content is written with age-appropriate reading levels and interests are targeted, articles, activities, and other resources are intended to be free from bias and include no political or social agendas.

While the student editions provide engaging and explicit standards coverage, even more value can be found in the Teacher's Edition. This guide provides teaching material and strategies for each article or activity from the student edition, including background knowledge, vocabulary words, lesson plans, classroom activities, reteaching strategies, ELA connections, assessments, literature connections, and even videos to foster a vibrant learning experience. The curriculum is vetted by outside sensitivity readers from various races, cultures, and groups to ensure a lack of bias.



ties to show understanding in both limited English and academic English-supported contexts.


