Strengthens speaking, listening, and writing: Built-in collaboration and projects provide frequent opportunities for communication and expression

Fosters structured academic conversations: Varied grouping (pairs, small groups, whole class) encourages discussion and reflection

Develops language and vocabulary: Students build academic and social studies vocabulary through reading and interactive activities
